



Current Staff of 75 OUSD Libraries




State of OUSD Libraries




Over half of existing library programs are open less than 50% of the time.

California State Standards for Libraries



- One credentialed Teacher Librarian for every 785 students
- One Library Technician
- Open to students a minimum of 36 hour a week
- Houses a minimum of 28 books per student, 2/3 of collection is less than 15 years old
- Students have remote access to virtual library pages and on line educational data

Recommendations

- Develop a set of standards around quality school libraries for board recommendations
- Invite diverse stakeholders to inform the development of quality school libraries in OUSD
- Continue to leverage foundations for developing book collections for school libraries

Recommendations

- Continue to partner with principals to leverage local funds and LCFF funds to provide staffing
- Continue to work with community partners to restore and support school libraries
- Include school libraries as part of the School Quality Review process
- Consider state-of-the-art libraries in future facility designs
